THEDA BARA, the most famous vampire of film history, is a name to be conjured with. Her portrayals of "the woman who did not care" brought her fame and wealth and love. She was at the peak of her career. Then came the influenza, the dread plague that ravaged the land like its fore-runner of history, the Black Death. And Theda Baraso the whisperers state, fell a victim. But the name was too valuable to be lost, according to the eery tale the whisperers tell. VIGOROUS denial of Theda Bara's death led Screenland to take steps to investigate the truth of the rumor. A life-long acquaintance of Theda Bara's was questioned as to the possible veracity of the rumor. He scoffed at it.

"I have not seen Theda for 'two years," he said. "The last time was when she was playing on the legitimate stage in The Blue Flame.
